EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Child health outcomes across the UK are among the poorest in western Europe despite having one of the most advanced healthcare systems in the world. Wales has the worst rates for childhood obesity in the UK and child death rates in the most deprived parts of Wales are much higher than the least deprived. At the same time healthcare services are under increasing strain, notably the demand for specialist mental health support for children.

In education there is an opportunity to address these challenges and take concerted action to improve health outcomes for children and young people. The Healthy and Sustainable Pre School Scheme (HSPSS) and Welsh Network of Healthy Schools Scheme (WNHSS) are recognised by the World Health Organisation (WHO) as playing a key role in promoting and protecting the physical, emotional and social health and well-being of children and young people in Wales.

In Flintshire four staff are funded by Public Health Wales to support 79 schools and 44 pre-school settings to actively participate in both the WNHSS and HSPSS. Currently 10 schools have achieved the National Quality Award for Healthy Schools and 11 pre-school settings have completed the HSPSS.

This report has been produced in response to members seeking an update on progress of both schemes within the authority.

REPORT DETAILS

PROGRAMME OVERVIEW 1.00 1.01 1. Welsh Network of Healthy School Schemes (WNHSS) The Flintshire Healthy Schools Scheme was launched in October 2000, and is one of 22 schemes in Wales which form the Welsh Network of Healthy School Schemes (WNHSS). The WNHSS is funded by Welsh Government, and managed by Public Health Wales (PHW); and on a local level is actively supported by Betsi Cadwalader University Health Board (BCUHB) and Flintshire County Council. The WNHSS is part of the Schools for Health in Europe (SHE) Network and also addresses the Welsh Government's seven core aims and the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC). All maintained nursery, primary, secondary, special schools and pupil referral units in Flintshire, in addition to Bryn Tirion Hall School participate in the Healthy Schools Scheme which equates to 79 settings. The Flintshire Healthy Schools Scheme works to ensure that health education and promotion becomes an integrated part of the school curriculum, the ethos of the school and community. The Scheme works in partnership with local and national organisations to ensure a coordinated and multi-faceted approach to health within schools. Schools progress through the scheme by achieving 'Phases'. In Phases 1-3 a school is required to plan and implement actions relating to different health themes that are identified on a school / local level. In Phases 4 - 6 a school is supported in order to evidence how they meet national criteria across 7 health themes: Food and Fitness School Environment Safety Personal Development and Relationships • Substance Use and Misuse (includes drugs, alcohol and tobacco) • Emotional and Mental Health and Well Being (including staff health and well-being). Within each theme schools are required to demonstrate an embedded whole school approach in the following aspects of school life: • Leadership and communication (includes staff development, policies, procedures, engagement in initiatives/interventions) Curriculum (includes extra-curricular and educational visits) • Ethos and environment (includes staff involvement, pupil participation) • Family and community involvement (links with the family or outside agencies). Upon completion of Phase 5, a school may choose to work towards achieving the National Quality Award (NQA). The NQA is an excellence award for schools that can demonstrate the highest standards in health and wellbeing as part of a whole school approach which is assessed independently over a two day visit and the provision of evidence portfolios.

The local authority has nationally agreed targets for schools achieving each phase of the scheme, see section 1.02 for performance against targets.

2. Healthy & Sustainable Pre Schools Scheme (HSPSS)

The Healthy and Sustainable Pre School Scheme (HSPSS) was launched nationally in 2011 and was developed as an extension of the Welsh Network of Healthy Schools Scheme (WNHSS). The criteria for the HSPSS have clear parallels with the WNHSS National Quality Award.

As of January 2018 there are 44 settings participating in the Flintshire healthy pre-school scheme. Settings targeted prioritise those within the lower two fifths of deprivation, as measured by the Welsh Index of Multiple Deprivation in order to reduce inequalities in health.

The HSPSS in Flintshire consist of:

- Childminders x 7
- Playgroups x 13
- Cylch x 6
- Day nursery x16
- Creche x 2

The purpose of the Healthy and Sustainable Pre School Settings (HSPSS) grant is to facilitate implementation of national guidance, changes in planning and delivery, policy/practice, and environment that are consistent with good health outcomes.

A setting is supported in order to evidence how they meet national criteria across 7 health topics:

- Nutrition and Oral Health
- Physical Activity/Active Play
- Mental and Emotional Health
- Wellbeing and Relationships
- Environment
- Safety
- Hygiene
- Workplace Health and Wellbeing

Within each topic settings are expected to introduce health improvement topics into four domains:

- Leadership & Communication
- Planning & Delivery
- Ethos & Environment
- Family & Community Involvement

For each health topic, the setting must show that it is promoting health and well-being through its policies, planning and ethos. At the end of each topic the setting is locally assessed and once they meet the required standards, they are accredited by Public Health Wales.

Of the 44 settings participating in HSPSS, 11 have completed the scheme and a further 3 are scheduled their final assessment before end of March

At the end of March 2017 there were 26 settings from 40 that had completed the Nutrition and Oral Health topic criteria and to date this has increased by 6 to 32 settings in total. 1 setting is also scheduled before the end of March 2018.

At the end of March 2017, there were 20 settings from 40 that had completed Page 6

the Physical Activity and Active Play criteria and to date this has been increased by 7. There are 27 settings in total that have completed this topic with a further 2 scheduled before the end of March 2018.

1.03 School Health Research Network (SHRN)

The School Health Research Network (SHRN) is a partnership between Welsh Government, Public Health Wales (PHW), Cancer Research UK and the Wales Institute of Social and Economic Research, Data and Methods. It is led by Cardiff University and brings together secondary schools across Wales and academic researchers, policy-makers and practitioners from health, education and social care. The Healthy Schools team are the main point of contact for SHRN in Flintshire.

The SHRN aims to improve young people's health and wellbeing in the school setting by providing robust health and wellbeing data for school, regional and national stakeholders;

SHRN was initially launched in 2013 with funding from the Medical Research Council. In 2015/16, with funding from Health and Care Research Wales, half of all secondary schools in Wales (115) joined which included three Flintshire secondary schools. In 2017 recruitment was open to all secondary and middle schools with all secondary schools in Flintshire now participating following successful engagement in the summer term with head teachers and the recruitment of in-school coordinators.

Pupils in SHRN schools are required to complete a bilingual electronic survey every two years. The survey is based on the World Health Organisation's collaborative Health Behaviour of School-aged Children (HBSC) Survey to allow integration of the two surveys every four years and is accompanied by a School Environment Questionnaire, which allows relationships between school policies and practices and student health to be investigated.

All Flintshire secondary schools have undertaken the survey during the Autumn term 2017 and will be issued with their individual research findings at the end of the Spring term 2018, alongside a county report. Schools will then be supported to share their data with their whole school community and action plan accordingly. An event for school council representatives will take place in March 2018 to help pupils understand how to interpret research data and action plan, which will support them ahead of receiving their school SHRN report in April 2018.

1.04 School Holiday Enrichment Programme (SHEP)

The SHEP is a school-based programme that provides healthy meals, food and nutrition education, physical activity and enrichment sessions to children during the summer holidays.

During the school holidays, when Free Breakfast in Primary Schools and Free School Meals are not available, some families struggle to afford or access food that provides a healthy diet. Some children also experience social isolation and limited stimulation during the holidays, which may also contribute to widening the attainment gap.

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SHEP was piloted in Wales in 2016 with 10 schools participating from 5 local authorities and evaluated by Cardiff University. In 2017 this increased to 38 schools from 12 local authorities. Funding has since been allocated in the Welsh Government draft budget until 2019/20 to expand the programme.

In Flintshire a local SHEP steering group has been established by the Healthy Schools team during the Autumn term 2017and two schools have been approached to host the clubs during summer 2018. A funding application has been submitted in January 2018 with the outcome anticipated by February 9th 2018. If successful, members of the healthy schools team will work with partners in accordance with local steering group in order to establish a programme of delivery for both sites including budgeting and staffing.

2.00	RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS
2.01	Both schemes are grant funded by Public Health Wales on an annual basis. The funding in 2017-18 consisted of four separate grants: • WNHSS grant • HSPSS grant • Obesity grant • e-bug grant.
2.02	Public Health Wales have not confirmed the grant funding allocation for 2018-19 to date. A letter to the Interim Chief Officer for Education and Youth from PHW in December 2017 states that they 'do not anticipate any significant change in the level of funding, and will be able to confirm the actual allocation in February 2018'.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report is to provide members with a summary of the final verified pupil attainment for Key Stage 4 and Key Stage 5 for the school year 2016-17. This updates the provisional figures reported on for the Scrutiny meeting of 5th October 2017. The pupil attainment information is derived from public examinations during the school year 2016-17.

The report also provides a summary of data in relation to attendance and exclusions.

The Local Authority, in partnership with the Regional School Improvement and Effectiveness Service (GwE), endeavours to secure high quality outcomes for its learners. All Flintshire schools benefit from the regional Challenge and Support programme according to their support category and needs.

GwE continues to work closely with the Local Authority to ensure that all schools, but particularly secondary schools, are accurately tracking pupil progress towards published targets to ensure a better match between predicted and actual outcomes.

The learner outcomes data in this report refers to the performance of all pupils in Flintshire, including those in specialist schools, pupil referral units and those educated 'other than at school'.

RECOMMENDATIONS

That members receive the report and note the verified attainment of Flintshire children and young people at Key Stages 4 and 5 for the year 2016-17.

REPORT DETAILS

1.00	EXPLAINING THE LEARNER OUTCOMES REPORT
1.01	Assessments at Key Stage 4 and Key Stage 5 are carried out through examination in individual curriculum subjects.
1.02	Pupils are assessed at the end of each key stage at the following ages: Key Stage 4 – 16 year olds (National Curriculum Year 11) Key Stage 5 – 18 year olds (National Curriculum Year 13)
1.03	Attached to this report are individual annexes which provide the detailed analysis of the performance of both key stage 4 and 5 for 2017.
1.04	An additional appendix is attached which outlines attendance data (2016/17) and exclusion data (2015/16) for Flintshire primary and secondary schools.
1.05	At KS4's main indicator, Level 2+ (5A*-C GCSEs including English/Welsh & Mathematics or Mathematics- Numeracy), performance was 57%. The outcomes at this L2+ indicator placed it 9th across Wales and 2nd in the GwE region. It is important to note that Qualifications Wales and the Welsh Government have clearly reported that changes in the content, structure and assessment methodology of some GCSE examinations, including English, Welsh and mathematics, which are being reported for the first time this year, have impacted on the overall results across Wales for 2017. These changes make it difficult to make meaningful comparisons to the results from 2016.
1.06	In post 16 education, comparisons of performance are much more difficult to make. The Level 3 threshold indicator for Flintshire in 2017 was just lower than the All Wales figure by 0.1% and lower than Flintshire's 2016 performance by 1.5%. The % of students achieving 3A*/ A grades has increased from 4.1% in 2015 to 8.3% in 2017 reducing the gap with national performance.

2.00	RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS
2.01	The Council commissions its school improvement services through GwE via an Inter-Authority Agreement with the other North Wales councils. This sets the value of the financial contribution from Flintshire which can be reviewed every three years.

3.00	CONSULTATIONS REQUIRED / CARRIED OUT
3.01	Learner outcome data is a core element of the annual self-evaluation procedures undertaken by the Education & Youth Portfolio and this is consulted upon with all key education stakeholders.

4.00	RISK MANAGEMENT
4.01	Anti-poverty Impact – The Local Authority seeks to mitigate the impact of poverty through its partnership work programme and through the careful monitoring by GwE Supporting Improvement Advisers of how schools use their Pupil Development Grant (PDG) to support those pupils at risk of potential underachievement. Schools are also required to publish their plans for the use of PDG annually.
4.02	Equalities Impact – The 2011 LAESCYP inspection undertaken by Estyn recognised good practice in provision for pupils' wellbeing and additional learning needs. This continues to be reflected in Flintshire's values, strategy, provision and outcomes.
4.03	Environmental Impact – None
4.04	'Schools do not make best of use of the support from the Regional Improvement Service (GwE) or the Council to ensure the best outcomes for their learners' is the key risk identified in the Council Improvement Plan. This is mitigated against by the Challenge and Support Programme, the regular interaction between senior LA and GwE officers and through the School Performance Monitoring Group.

Appendix 1

Flintshire County Council Key Stage 4 Results: 2017

Background Summary

Welsh Government issue final comparative data for Key Stage 4 much later than for the earlier key stages. The statistical release "Examination Results in Wales 2016/17" was issued on 6th December 2017 and provides the results of external examinations taken by pupils in year 11 at the start of the academic year. This updates the provisional figures shared at Education and Youth Overview Scrutiny Committee on 5th October 2017.

It has been acknowledged by Qualifications Wales and the Welsh Government that changes in the content, structure and assessment methodology of some GCSE examinations, including English, Welsh and mathematics, which are being reported for the first time this year, have impacted on the overall results across Wales for 2017. There have also been several key changes made to Key Stage 4 performance measures data in 2016 /2017. It is not possible to quantify the impact of these changes in policy to pupil and school choices around curriculum options and entry. Therefore, comparisons with previous years should be avoided in many cases.

Introduction of the Capped 9 Score

The Capped 9 measure focuses on results from nine of the qualifications available, including subject specific requirements in English/ Welsh, Mathematics Numeracy, Mathematics and two science outcomes.

Cap on Non-GCSEs to threshold measures

From 2017, a maximum of two vocational qualifications will count towards performance measures, depending on the size of the qualification.

Literature in threshold measures

Literature qualifications no longer count towards the literacy elements in Level 2 inclusive (L2+) or Capped 9 score. They can still count in the non- subject specific elements.

New Mathematics GCSEs

For the first time, pupils are expected to sit two GCSEs in mathematics – GCSE Mathematics and GCSE Mathematics Numeracy.

There were 1,602 Flintshire pupils at the start of the academic year 2016/2017.

These learner outcomes include results for maintained schools, including special schools, Pupil Referral Units (PRUs), and pupils receiving education other than that at school that are not in PRUs, achieved during the academic year and any examinations taken at an earlier age.

- Flintshire had the highest outcomes in the GwE region for performance in individual core subjects of English, Mathematics, Mathematics Numeracy and Science.
- KS4 English/Welsh First Language achievement in Flintshire at L2 was 1.9% above performance across Wales.

- KS4 Mathematics achievement at L2 was 3.7% above performance across Wales and KS4 Mathematics Numeracy was 6% above. Best of maths performance was 5% above the national figure.
- KS4 Science achievement was 4.4% above performance across Wales.
- Good individual performance in each of these subjects was not fully translated into a higher outcome at Level 2+ due to read across data where a pupil might achieve English/ Welsh First Language but not a qualification in mathematics and vice versa. A continued focus this year will be on supporting schools to make more effective and timely use of tracking systems to plan effective intervention and to address any underperformance within this context.

Key Stage 5 Results: 2017 Background Summary

The National Assembly for Wales issued GCE A level and equivalent achievements information for Wales, 2016/17 in their First Release "Examination Results in Wales, 2016/17", on December 6th 2017.

These statistics include results of external examinations taken by pupils aged 17 at the beginning of the academic year in schools in Wales.

Comparisons of performance are much more difficult to make in post 16 education. As the figures are for schools, the number of students represented in the figures is only a proportion of those in 16-19 education overall. The proportion of those pupils being educated in schools in each authority area will vary, as may the proportion of students who completed the courses they started. Figures are based only on those students who did complete courses.

LA SUMMARY RESULTS GCSE A LEVEL EXAMINATIONS AND EQUIVALENT (LEVEL 3)

In 2017 there were 541 17 year old pupils entered for the equivalent to 2 A Levels. Key Indicators of performance show:

- Females continue to outperform males in Flintshire on headline indicators at Key Stage 5. This reflects the national picture of gender performance at age 17.

- The gap in performance for the Average Wider Point score indicator has reduced.

Attendance and Exclusions in Flintshire Primary & Secondary Schools: 2016/17

Background Summary

1.1 School attendance is a high priority both for the Welsh Government and local authorities in their aim to improve standards. Unauthorised absence across Flintshire schools remains very low at 0.4% in primary schools and 0.8% in secondary schools, both of which are the second lowest value in Wales. Authorised absence includes family holidays, medical/dental appointments, study leave, Traveller absence, exclusion and pupil illness which continues to be one of the main factors affecting attendance rates.

Attendance in primary schools showed a slight improvement of 0.1% on the previous year 2015/16 however, there was a reduction of 0.4% across secondary schools.

1.3 Range of Attendance across Schools

Table 2 below shows the spread of attendance figures across the primary and secondary sectors. This demonstrates that the majority of our schools have attendance figures around or in excess of the Welsh average. Those schools showing lower percentages include the areas with a more transient population and in particular a high school which closed at the end of the academic year. The LA recognises the difficulties experienced by particular schools and both the LA and schools have targeted resources to help support improvement.

1.5 Permanent Exclusions from School

The number of permanent exclusions from Flintshire schools remained very low in both the primary and secondary sector. The year reported is 2015/16 in line with Welsh Government reports. Internal data shows an increase in permanent exclusions in 2016/17. This will be reported as validated data following the statistical release from Welsh Government.

1.6 Fixed Term Exclusions from School

The number of fixed term exclusions for 5 days or less and for more than 5 days increased from the previous year. LA officers continue to work alongside schools to target a reduction in the number of days lost through exclusions. Training has been provided for schools to support the development of appropriate engagement strategies such as the ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistant) programme, Person Centred Planning and also the establishment of the Family Engagement Forum.

The rate due to exclusions of over 5 days was 1.9 compared to the Welsh Average of 1.4. Whilst there has been a slight increase of 0.1 in the rate compared to 2014/15, this remains significantly lower than that of 2.9 in 2012/2013. The rate of exclusions of 5 days appears to show a significant increase however, the dataset for 2015/16 now includes exclusions form Pupil Referral Units making it difficult to make direct comparisons to previous years. Nationally, this accounts for an increase in rate per 1000 pupils from 28.8 to 30.9. The most common reason for exclusions of this type is persistent, disruptive behaviour. Verified data for 2016-17 is released by Welsh Government in September 2018.
